ane and I were so sorry to have to miss the recent AGM but obviously delighted to hear that it was a very enjoyable and successful evening.

As I write British Summer Time is fast approaching and please forgive the pun, but that seems to put a real spring into our steps after a rather dismal spell!!

Anyway there are interesting and indeed stimulating times ahead with a proposed participation and partnership with the SRU. This is a major initiative being launched by Murrayfield and described as a five year Growth and Participation Fund which is tagged Future Proofing the Community Game and is funded at 1 million pounds per year for the next five years, using Scottish Government monies allocated in support of the recovery from the Pandemic. Half of this money will support major capital investments and the other half will be split to support Club-led projects in three distinct areas; Women and Girls (£150K per annum), Development Environments (£150K per annum) and State Schools (£200K per annum).

This is a 5 year partnership and we will probably focus on jointly branded rugby balls (in much the same way as we have been doing with the Balls 4 Schools initiative) for participating State Schools, for both boys and girls.

Pete Burgon, who is the SRU's Glasgow and North Regional Director will be our main point of contact but we will also have free access to the other Regional Directors. Meantime Pete will be our Guest Speaker at the Summer Dinner.

This is a significant game changing strategy in Scotland and a really unique opportunity to highlight the role FoSR has and will continue to play in Scottish Rugby.

Awards Background

ach year at the Friends of Scottish Rugby Annual General Meeting Dinner, two quaiches are presented to up and coming players.

The Sir Willie Purves Quaich was first awarded to Donnie MacFadyen in 2000 and this was followed by the Sir Tommy Macpherson Quaich in 2011 and was presented to Anthony Kent.

In March 2019 we introduced the Lady Jean Macpherson Women's Trophy which is presented to the most aspiring female Scottish player.

To date, there have been 35 winners (see table on following page for details) and between them, they have won 666 caps for Scotland and amassed 666 points.

The Sir Willie Purves Quaich was awarded to Glasgow Warriors Open-side Flanker, Rory Darge

Rory came through the Edinburgh academy, signing his first professional contract in July 2020 and making his debut for Edinburgh in Round 6 of the 2020–21 Pro14 against Leinster.

In April 2021 it was announced that he would move to Glasgow Warriors where his work rate and speed both with ball in hand and at the breakdown typify a player who has impressed many onlookers.

Darge won 13 caps for Scotland U20 and made his Scotland debut against Wales in the Guinness Six Nations.

The **Sir Tommy Macpherson Quaich** was awarded to London Scottish Fly-half, Harry Sheppard.

Harry started his adult career with Wasps during the 2014/2015 season before joining London Scottish for 2 seasons. He then moved to Bedford Blues for a couple of seasons before returning to London Scottish.

Harry is predominantly a Fly-half but can also play at inside centre. He is recognised for his ferocious defence as well as his deft ball handling and accurate kicking game.

He was very much looking forward to accepting the quaich in person but unfortunately he tested positive for Covid on the morning of the event.

The quaich was presented by Ishbel Macpherson and accepted by Noah Ferdinand and Brian Tualagi on Harry's behalf.
